FAIRVENTURES FAMILY



Fairventures Worldwide is a non-profit organization based in Stuttgart with country offices in Uganda and Indonesia. We empower smallholder farmers in the tropics to generate income through reforestation, creating sustainable forests that produce timber and food. To support our holistic agroforestry approach and enhance transparency, we utilize modern monitoring technologies such as the TREEO app.



Our sister company Fairventures Social Forestry (FSF) combines the implementation of a sustainable climate solution with a green return on investments. By implementing sustainable agroforestry in cooperation with local communities in Indonesia, FSF creates positive ecological, social and financial impact at the same time.



To help set companies on the path to net-zero (emissions), TREEO (Fairventures Digital) provides them with traceable and reliable data about high-quality CO2-Removals while empowering tree growers through the TREEO Technology and giving them access to the carbon market.





REFORESTATION FOR BORNEO

Transforming learnings into actions

2023 was a year of change in Indonesia. After 10 years of work, we had to acknowledge that not everything was working as anticipated in Indonesia. As we have described in our last annual report, some of our most fundamental assumptions had to be revised: many of the trees planted in the early years of our work were not growing as fast as predicted and the mortality rates from these years were higher than expected, the profits from the first Sengon timber harvest were not significant

enough to make a difference in our farmers lives and 10 years after we started, there were still no credible timber offtakers in Central Kalimantan. Much work in 2023 was dedicated to address these short-comings. With the planting season 2023/24, a new approach started to take shape by diversifying the number of trees and potential income streams for farmers. Our successful cocoa program showed us that cocoa could be an important pillar of this new, diversified approach, and have since extended cocoa planting to all new farmers. Alongside cocoa, we have added fast-growing timber trees that are used in Central Kalimantan, fruit trees and Jengkol and Petai, trees with edible beans that are a popular food source in Indonesia. In evolving our approach, we listened carefully to what farmers told us, and redesigned our

activities from the ground up. Questioning the very foundations of our work was not an easy process, but one that we had to go through and that, in the end, made us become a better partner for our farmers. Alongside tree planting, we have also taken a giant leap in regard to monitoring. In 2023, we monitored all the newly planted trees with TREEO for the first time. We are already looking forward to repeating this exercise, providing our supporters, with even more transparency. We will continue to gather data that will allow us to improve our planting work year after year. Last but not least, we have changed our organizational setup. After more than 10 years of work in Indonesia, we have supported our Indonesian team to set up their own organization, The Good Forest Indonesia foundation. The Indonesian team implements our projects no longer as our branch office, but as a fully equal partner. We strongly believe that development belongs in the hands of the local people, and believe this is a formalization of our beliefs.









LIGHTWOOD ROADSHOW

Indonesia Special

Our reforestation effort has taught us the vital role of community involvement in successfully implementing our programs. Therefore we are taking a proactive approach to engage the entire community instead of just concentrating on smallholder farmers by organizing an event

called the "Lightwood Roadshow". What sets the Lightwood Roadshow apart from our previous socialization efforts is its efficiency and broader reach. Within just one month, we have visited 14 different villages, targeting a more diverse audience. By personally visiting each village and holding short but impactful meetings integrated in the people's markets and traditional gatherings, we fostered trust with the community. Our aim was to raise awareness about the importance of environmental conservation through reforestation and responsible timber value chains.

By focusing on rural areas in Central Kalimantan, we hoped to address the lack of awareness about potential threats there, such as flooding during the rainy season. Therefore we are happy to report over 921 participants at our roadshow in just one month. Educating the community about the potential of reforestation counteracting natural disasters is an essential part of the roadshow.

Farmer Story

Herlianto manages over 2.6 hectares of land including rubber trees and Jengkol. After attending a series of our information events in his village in 2021, he decided to additionally join our program in the beginning of 2022. So now he has been able to place Sengon trees between all his rubber trees and enriched his land. In the near future an additional hectare with trees and cocoa will be added throughout our program.


Herlianto's passion for farming and the forest also results in him being the village's farmer coordinator. "As the coordinator, I am once again striving to bring together the visions of the farmers in this village", he explains proudly. Over 60% of the people in the village are farmers, the rest of them work mostly in the palm oil or private timber sector.

This also demonstrates the possible outreach a person like Herlianto can have and how he can positively impact the community and therefore the environment. Being a native from Tumbang Manggu and having served as the village head for more than six years, he understands the local people's needs best and also how to address them.

Beyond the promise of a sustainable future for the environment, he envisions a brighter path for his village and himself:

"Trees can be a commodity that gives all of us hope for the future. Besides contributing to the environment, they also provide us with economic support."





LASTING SOLUTIONS FOR UGANDA

Success comes with its challenges

In 2023, our work in Uganda really came into its own. Over the two rainy seasons in 2023, we distributed more than 500,000 tree seedlings of more than 10 different species in Uganda. We monitored all surviving trees with TREEO, completed the con-

struction of the Timber Innovation Center and supported our partner Uganda Timber Growers Association to start reforestation work on one of the threatened protected forest areas in the country. In summary, these great developments mean that in Uganda we have now a well established, impactful second country program standing proudly next to our program in Indonesia. In many ways, the seeds of these successes were sown by our great Ugandan team in the pandemic years. Focusing consequently on a decentralised approach, we built 16 nurseries, which allowed us to work through the travel restrictions of the pandemic and gave us the opportunity to really scale our work in 2023. However, our success didn't

come without challenges. Uganda is significantly affected by changing weather patterns due to climate change, which is exacerbated by the El Niño phenomenon, leading to flooding and droughts (p.22). These changes have led to lower than expected tree survival rates and many operational challenges. Using our monitoring data to pair the right types of trees with the right sites and getting a better understanding of tree planting under highly uncertain weather conditions will be crucial to carry forward the success of 2023 and address the challenges.

Alongside tree planting, we have been working hard on expanding our network. In 2023, we entered into new partnerships with local government and academic institutions, creating visibility for tree planting through highly visible seedling distribution and planting events. Together with our partners, we are convinced we can reach even more in 2024.









TIMBER INNOVATION CENTER

Building a sustainable future: The Opening of Uganda's first Timber Innovation Centre

On World Environment Day 2023, we opened our Timber Innovation Center (TIC) in the heart of Kampala. It aims to bring together professionals and stakeholders from the forestry and construction sectors to promote and advance sustainable timber construction in Uganda and wider East Africa. The launch event was attended by numerous stakeholders, including the German ambassador Matthias Schauer, Italian Deputy Ambassador, Mr Mario Savona and FAO Country Representative Dr Antonio Querido.

Timber stores carbon and can replace as well as reduce the usage of environmental harmful materials like concrete or plastics. By embracing sustainable practices and using timber as a viable building material, the TIC sets an example for a more sustainable future.

"The Timber Innovation Center is an inspiration to show what is possible with timber," said Fairventures CEO Wolfgang Baum, who was also present.



Farmer Story

Tilulaga Buluhani is a farmer from the Buhende District in the eastern region of Uganda.

Tilulaga joined our program in 2022. He took part in our farmer field schools and received tree seedlings from our community nursery in Kaazi, Kampala. With passion and care, he has already planted over 500 Grevellia seedlings alongside other food crops like maize and sweet potatoes.

Tilulaga is optimistic about improving his livelihood through the sustainable use of the harvested timber and being able to pay his children's school fees more easily in the future.

"As a farmer working with Fairventures Worldwide, I am joining hands to fight against deforestation by planting trees to restore the ecosystem and make a long-term personal investment through timber cultivation."









PHINEO IMPACT SEAL

Our impact on climate protection has been awarded

On 6 November 2023, we were officially awarded the PHINEO impact seal in Berlin.
Our "100 Million Trees" reforestation project in

Indonesia was highlighted with the seal of impact for climate protection. As a non-profit platform, PHINEO uses scientific methods to evaluate the objective impact of charitable projects and honours them with the seal of approval. We were selected from over 101 applicants alongside 14 others, such as the NABU Foundation National Natural Heritage, ForTomorrow and the Siemens Foundation.

"The PHINEO Impact Seal means a lot to us. Because even though we know internally about our impact, it is all the more important that potential donors can objectively ensure that their money is being used effectively to make a difference," said Wolfgang Baum, CEO of Fairventures Worldwide in Stuttgart.

We are proud that, despite all the challenges we face time and time again in our work, our projects have a proven impact. We will continue to work on this in the future and maximise our impact in the best possible way. There is now an official profile of us on the PHINEO website.

CLIMATE STORIES

New climate education project receives award

"Climate Stories" is the name of Fairventures' new climate education project that we launched in early 2023. In Climate Stories, high school students in Germany connect with young engaged people from the Global South through digital encounters. The climate crises can feel overwhelming, but it is abstract to many people yet. By providing people already affected by climate change a platform, we hope to make climate change more tangible and to humanize the often scientific nature


of the narrative. In their Climate Stories, they share their concerns, hopes and dreams and collaborate with students in Germany to develop ideas for a more climate-just future. The project is carried out with funding from the European Union, and through the support of the State Ministry of Baden-Württemberg, and the Baden-Württemberg Foundation for Development Cooperation (SEZ) as part of the "Mindchangers – Regions and Youth for Planet and People" program.

In October, we had the honor of receiving the Academy Award of the Protestant Academy Bad Boll, which comes with a prize of €2,500. Climate Stories was the winner among a total of 24 submissions. Tobias Weise, Chairman of the academy's Sponsoring Association, highlighted in his laudatory speech the award's question, "How do you inspire for more climate

protection?" which aimed to engage younger individuals. In his view, this is precisely what Climate Stories achieves:

"The approach of not communicating climate change and its consequences with abstract figures but instead amplifying the voice of young people directly affected by it as well as enabling dialogue with local youth, has inspired us."

Personal exchanges achieve what textbooks cannot. Listening to voices from the Global South is a crucial step towards a more climate-just future.

Climate Change has been affecting our work throughout 2023. Indonesia and Uganda faced challenges triggered by El Niño. On the ground, the effects were quite different. In Indonesia, draughts led to higher incidences of forest fires, while in Uganda heightened rainfall led to floods and mudslides.

In Central Kalimantan, where our project is located, the haze of the fires took a toll on people's lives. The air was so bad that masks became a must when going outside. The situation pushed the government to declare a state of emergency and to experiment with weather modification techniques to make it rain. Fortunately, the numbers of affected trees were low in our project areas and the lost trees will be replanted.

"Climate change is the reason why we do what we do and also our biggest challenge along the way. We have to learn to adapt our work to quick changes in extreme weather conditions." - Megan King, CEO of Fairventures Worldwide.





In Uganda climate change caused an excess of what Indonesia would have needed - rain. In the Kayunga District, the ongoing downpours have caused damage to our farmer's field near the banks of the River Nile, resulting in a loss of over 200 trees in October 2023. The downpour went on for three days intermittently and lead to flooding that submerged a sizable expanse of the area. Our Farmer Training Facilitator for Kayunga District recorded in the incident report: "This area lies in a rain shadow and receives less rain and longer droughts than the surrounding areas. With 50 acres planted in the last season, the young seedlings have suffered significant damage from the floods."

Fortunately, there are solutions to tackling the challenges and preventing future negative impacts. Additional drainage channels have

been dug, and plans are underway to replace the trees that were destroyed, with more watertolerant species.

Being confronted with events like these, vividly shows the necessity to fight climate change. Planting more trees is a simple yet impactful way to contribute. Let's collectively take action to safeguard our environment for current and future generations.

"We had anticipated El Niño this season and made preparations, including the creation of drainage channels. However, the excessive rainfall surpassed our expectations, leading to the flooding of the trees," explained our training faciltator in the Kayunga district, Uganda.






